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Celebration of Achievements Event Spotlights Learners, Volunteers, and Community

The annual Celebration of Achievements recognizing learners' milestone achievements in the past year was held on November 2nd at the Delaplaine Arts Center.

The evening featured a colorful and informative slideshow highlighting the Literacy Council's 60th anniversary, with narration by veteran volunteer Caroline Gaver. And recent students were enthusiastically applauded for their certificates of achievement, including four students accompanied by their tutors, for receiving their U.S. citizenship.

Waverly Elementary parent, Ana, was joined by her family and her tutor/instructor, John Bruton, as she shared her literacy journey in a moving video testimonial. The legacy of longtime tutor Gene Beall was remembered by former student, Martha, and daughter, Cyndi McNamara. Each spoke of the 24-year relationship between the two families that grew from Gene's weekly tutoring sessions with Martha and her husband. Martha shared: "We cannot tell our story without talking about Mr. Beall ... because he became ... like the angel that is being put into your life to guide you."

Community Collaboration Expands Access to Critical Literacy Programs

As the need for English language programs for adult learners grows, the Literacy Council is expanding inter-agency coordination. Greater access to these volunteer-taught programs is now available with the recent addition of a class at the Asian American Center's newly opened Family Support Center, ongoing classes at several Frederick County Public Libraries locations, the Judy Centers' Early Childhood Literacy Programs at six elementary schools, and the addition of Parent English classes this fall at Hillcrest Elementary. Resource fairs with Frederick Community College also provide pathways to students on their literacy journeys.

The Literacy Council's tutoring program has had an indelible impact on the lives of more than 10,000 area adults. It has in recent years expanded to allow even more learners access to dedicated volunteers. Targeted English language instruction to individuals or small groups of adults at beginning literacy levels—or to native English speakers struggling with reading or GED preparation—provides the boost needed to acquire the necessary skills to get to the next level. Gains in everyday life skills run the gamut: job certifications, driver's licenses, GED exams, enrollment at FCC, acquiring a job—or moving to a better one—and earning U.S. citizenship, as in the case of four students recognized during the Celebration event.
